All forms are due in the office by Friday, Feb. 5th. If you have a child that will be starting Pre-K or Kindergarten for the first time next fall, please include him/her on this form. Pre-K students must be 4 years old and K students must be 5 years old on or before August 31, 2016, as required by NC state law. All registration fees are due by Feb. 26th.

Catholic Schools week is Jan. 31-Feb.5. Thanks to our planning committee, we have come up with some new ideas for a fun week that will focus on service, and will make our school more visible in the community. All classes are involved in a service project during the week. Remember to send a note upon their return to school. We have had lice issues in a few classrooms several times this year. Please be diligent about checking your child's head often, and wash his/her coat, hat, scarf, bookbag, etc.

Please remind them never to share combs, brushes, hats, scarves, etc. Remember that the only acceptable outwear inside the classroom/school is an SPS crewneck sweatshirt or hoodie (MS only). Check to see that your child is properly dressed in the correct school uniform and is in compliance with the uniform policy concerning hair, socks, jewelry, etc. Always refer to the school handbook. PLEASE label your child's coat, sweatshirt, lunchbox, etc. Our Lost and Found is running over with nameless clothing articles.

Food Share

Over 22 years ago, Brother Robert Lafave. O.S.F., the Franciscan principal of St. Peter's Catholic School, wanted to help the people of Pitt County who were experiencing hunger and poverty. Brother Robert believed that Jesus walked among us in the poor and marginalized. He needed parent volunteers who were willing to give their time and effort to create such a program. He asked two parents to lead this program, Mrs. Tere Ruff and Mrs. Jean King. At the beginning of this program, families in need were invited to come to St. Peter's School one Saturday a month to receive a large food box with canned food, fresh fruits, vegetables and meats. Many parent volunteers including Mrs. Carol Leatherman, Mrs. Kathy Castillo, Mr. and Mrs. Mike Moore and many of our St. Peter's students prepared and packed the food boxes once a month. Hundreds of families were assisted in this way and served in other ways as they always came with many other needs besides food. With changes in administration, the program also had to change. Today, our students continue to bring canned food to assist our neighbors in need of Pitt County. The cans are taken to St. Vincent de Paul Society and are distributed from St. Peter Catholic Church every other Tuesday to families in need. In addition to the canned items, our middle school Beta Club members provide sandwiches every Thursday for the JOY Soup Kitchen. These sandwiches along with the soup that the 5th Grade teachers and their students prepare is picked up by alumni parent Mrs. Nancy Williams. The soup program has been in existence for 18 years.

SPS Development

The SPS Annual Fund Campaign is cruising along. As of January 6, 2016 we have received slightly over \$20,000.00 in donations. Our family participation level is only 20%. however, and we hope to do much better!

Once again, the faculty and staff participation level has reached 100%.

I recently received the following note from a SPCS parent:

"While I am happy that our school has raised over \$20k so far, it concerns...me that the amount (only 20% participation) is so low. I believe we have over 350 families at SPS. If only 20% have contributed, that would mean approximately 70 families, which probably also includes many staff members and teachers, pledging this \$20,000."

Please know that your contribution, no matter the amount, also counts toward our overall demonstration of family investiture for the awarding of grants as well as accreditation. Annual Fund collections are used as a measure of the confidence our families have in their school.
